EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

INTRODUCTORY NOTE ON THE INSTITUTION

Rourkela College, Rourkela has earned the distinction of being one of the premier educational institutions of Odisha. It is situated in the steel city of Rourkela which comes under the administrative jurisdiction of Sundargarh district. The College which was initially known as Rourkela Night College, and subsequently renamed Government Evening College, owes its origin to the initiative of the Government of Odisha. Originally Rourkela Evening College came into being as a result of the pioneering spirits of Sri. B.N. Mishra and Late H.K. Ray as well as some educational luminaries of Rourkela. The College began from 8th August, 1966.

The authorities of the Hindustan Steel Limited, Rourkela, were gracious enough to allow the college classes to be held on the premises of the present building at Sector-4. The college started functioning with 256 students in the Pre-University Arts; the Bachelor of Arts class (having 128 seats) was opened in the session 1968-69, Intermediate Commerce was opened in the year 1977 with 32 seats. In the same year the teaching of Honours facility was provided to 16 students each in English and political science. In 1979 the B. Com classes started with 32 seats. The Honours study in Economics and Oriya was also introduced in 1980-81. The Honours study facilities in History and Commerce were provided from 1981-82 and 1982-83 respectively. At the instance of the Sambalpur University, the Pre-University and First year Degree classes in Arts and Commerce were abolished in the session of 1977-78 as the two-year intermediate courses in Arts and Commerce were introduced followed by a two-year degree course. The +2 and +3 system of education were introduced with effect from 1983-84 and 1986-87 respectively. Now the college is providing teaching facilities to Arts and Commerce students having the sanction strength 256 and 128 respectively.

In 1989 a new phase began in the history of this college. After a long period of patient endeavour by the students, teachers and the people of Rourkela, the management of Rourkela Evening college was taken over by the Government of Odisha on 1st February 1989. The college was renamed Government Evening College, Rourkela.

In 2001 the Government of Odisha took a decision to separate the +2 College from +3 ones. Accordingly, vide G.O. No. 29412/ HE Dated 18.5.2001 the +2 stream has been separated from the +3 stream and the Government Evening College has been renamed Rourkela College, Rourkela.

LOCATION OF THE INSTITUTION

Rourkela College, Rourkela is located in the sylvan surroundings of sector-4 in Rourkela popularly known as the steel city or Ispat Nagar. It is situated about 328 kilometres in the west of the state capital Bhubaneswar and is surrounded by a range of hills and encircled by the rivers Koel, Sankha and Brahamani. The College is easily accessible by means of road, rail and air connectivity. The distance between the college and the railway station and the aerodrome is 3 kilometres and 6 kilometres respectively. One can come to the College by government city bus, auto rickshaw, OLA, and RAPIDO.

VISION AND MISSION OF THE INSTITUTION

Vision

To make the institution a favoured educational hub widely known for its excellence in teaching, research and creation of responsible citizens for the good of humanity.

- 1. Assisting students to fulfill their aspirations by the dedicated and responsive faculty.
- 2. Imparting a range of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for the holistic development of students.
- 3. Fostering leadership qualities among students in order to bolster up their morale to face the challenges of life.

5. Bringing up students hailing from rural and semi-urban areas with poor socioeconomic backgrounds and promoting a sense of social responsibility, cultural ethos, eco-consciousness, scientific temper and democratic practices among them.

TYPE OF THE INSTITUTION

Rourkela College, Rourkela which is affiliated to Sambalpur University is a Government institution. It is run by the fund received from the Government of Odisha and the teaching and non teaching members staff are recruited directly by the Odisha Public Service Commission(OPSC) and the Odisha Staff Selection Commission respectively. The students get admitted to this institution on their merits through the Students Academic Management System(SAMS) developed by the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Odisha.

CRITERION –WISE SUMMARY

1. Curricular Aspects

Rourkela College Rourkela provides teaching opportunities in Arts and Commerce. It strictly adheres to the curriculum framed by the Board of Studies of Sambalpur University, that has tried to restructure and reorient the knowledge of the young generation with greater consideration for conceptual understanding appreciation and the time available for teaching. The prescribed text books of the syllabi in Arts and Commerce attempt to enhance this endeavour by giving higher priority and space to opportunity for critical thinking, originality, creativity and scientific temper of the students. The teachers here transact the curriculum of Arts and Commerce through a well –planned and documented process. In this context, an academic calendar is prepared by the academic bursar and other senior faculty members of the college keeping an eye over the entire educational activities of the CBCS pattern of an academic year. The students are also given wide exposure to the studies of human values and ethics, gender study, environment, spoken English and disaster management project work apart from their honours studies. Not only this; the students get hands- on experience through field work and project assignments. The college conducts internal examinations prior to the commencement of the semester examinations and students' feedback is collected, analysed and appropriate remedial measures are taken.

2. Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

The students of this College (ST,SC,OBC,General, Divyanga) take admission in proportion to the policy adopted by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. Of Odisha. There is no breach of rule in this regard. So, the teaching, learning and evaluation activities of the College are carried out by the committed teachers and sincere students. The College being a government institution, the teachers are well- experienced enough to transact the lessons considering the cognitive, affective and psychology domains of the students. Though the college is understaffed, yet the teaching, learning and evaluation activities are done in full swing with the help of the young and vibrant guest faculty. Many of them were the alumni of this institution. Never are they made to feel that they are outsiders. So, the cordiality and congeniality of the teaching ambiance prevailed here allows the teachers and the students ample scope for the interpersonal interaction, participative and experiential learning. At the same time, the teachers satisfy the intellectual curiosity of the advanced learners by giving them exploratory questions and prescribing invaluable reference books for extensive reading. While dealing with the learning difficulties of the slow learners, the teachers give individual attention, conduct simple practice tests, take remedial classes and encourage them to be patient and consistent. By doing so, the teachers manage the class-room situation of varying magnitude. The teachers also conduct internal tests on the scheduled dates and address the students' grievances if any in a satisfactory manner.

3. Research, Innovation and Extension

Research can inform decision-making in higher education by providing evidence-based recommendation for policies and practices that can improve students' outcomes and enhance the overall quality of education. Some teachers of the college have made their research work in their chosen fields and published the research activities in UGC care journals. For this, they have not received any grants either from the government and non-governmental agencies.

Conducting seminars, conferences and workshops are the routine practice for the teachers and the students. Every Saturday the seminars or workshops are organised and the topics are vividly discussed at length for better clarity and understanding of the students. The national level or the state-level seminars have been conducted in on-line mode due to the COVID-19 pandemic situation loomed large in the country. The college is the right platform for the

extension and outreach programmes and they are rightly carried out by the NSS, YRC and Red Ribbon Club. As a result, the college and the community linkage is strengthened.

4. Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has the required number of class-rooms for different departments of the Arts and the commerce streams. The class rooms are airy and roomy and well equipped with fans and lights. For games and sports, there is a grassy playground surrounded by green trees. The students play the games like football, hockey, cricket, volleyball kho-kho, kabadi etc. during their leisure periods in the college field and keep themselves physically fit. The gymnasium and the yoga point of the college are the central focus of attention for those who want to have a sound body and mind. The centrality of educational endeavour of the college lies in its Library. The Library it has is rich and resourceful for the teachers and the students. The Library automation is underway by the use of the Integrated Library Management Software (koha) and the e-library has been functional by compiling Open Educational Resource (OER). The college has LAN connection by which all stakeholders of the college make access to the e-library, N-list and OPAC very easily.

5. Students support and progression

The progress of the students is directly proportional to the progress of the institution. If the students are supported in their chosen path of education, they can bring glory to the institution. In this institution, most of the students hail from the socially backward and economically emasculated families. For them, the Government of Odisha has made a provision of giving stipends to meet their immediate educational expenses. The students belonging to the reserved categories-STs, SCs, OBCs, Minority groups take the advantage of the government schemes and continue their career.

Some meritorious students have proved their mettle by qualifying in the NET/SLET/Civil Service Examinations and shown their brilliance in sports and cultural activities. The college, in order to bolster up the morale of the students, provide soft skills, language communication skills, life skills etc. in a time-bound manner. If any student has any grievance relating to his/her study or personal adjustment, the Grievance Redressal Cell makes its intervention and redresses the grievances forthwith. As a result, the present students and the alumni feel proud of their alma matar and give their financial support or other support services to the institution.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

The smooth functioning of the academic and administrative affairs of the college is a clear indication of its effective governance, leadership and management. The institutional practices such as teaching-learning process, pedagogy, evaluation of learning outcomes, audit, campus concern for greenery, community services etc. are thoroughly decentralised and sought to be participative from all quarters. The institution also provides room for the professional development or administrative training programmes for the teaching and non teaching staff. The teaching members go for UGC sponsored Refresher Course, Orientation, Induction programmes etc. while the non-teaching members are given training on documentary procedures of official management by the state government from time to time, At the same time, the members of staff are provided some welfare measures like maternity or paternity leave, medical leave, accommodation facility, games and sports, advance salary(For nonteaching only), canteen facilities, timely disbursion of salary and pension etc. for their comfortable stay. In matters of Leadership and Management, the students' leadership acumen and managerial skills are assessed in outreach and extension activities which provide them a lot of impetus for the accomplishment of the entrusted tasks. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the institution makes some useful strategies for the mobilization of different funds and optimal utilization of the available resources at the disposal of the institution. At the end of the academic year, the IQAC adopts a thorough institutional performance appraisal system for the teaching and the no-teaching staff.

7. Institutional Values and Best Practices

As stated earlier, the institution is located in the idyllic and sylvan surroundings of Rourkela in Sundargarh, district of Odisha. The prevalence of the lush green environment of the institution is the year-long caring concern of the students and teachers and alumni. The green campus initiative deserves special praise and appreciation as it gives restricted entry of automobiles, encourages battery-powered vehicles, imposes ban on the use of plastics, plants saplings and regulates waste materials. The rain water harvesting is encouraged among the students and guardians whereby they can understand the judicious use of water. Tolerance towards others, peaceful co-existence of different religious groups, community service, concern for the poor and the helpless, cleanliness, tree plantation, sensitization on constitutional obligations, values, rights, duties and responsibilities of citizens are some of the noble activities which are vigorously made a way of life or a habit for the students. The national and international commemorative days, events or festivals are observed with

carnivalesque fervour to make the students understand the social, cultural or political significance of the occasions.
